In actuality, businesses still need to assess if this strategy fits with their author-to-user ratio. For instance, a multinational corporation with 18,000 workers but only 15 instructional designers could seek to find out if a unified licensing model offers greater long-term value than separate Author and Consumer licenses.

SAP pricing conversations are usually addressed through bespoke quotations rather than published price lists because the answer relies on each organization's setup.

Licensing to Outside Users

External access is another factor that is frequently disregarded in early assessments. Numerous organizations must offer educational materials to:

- Suppliers and Contractors
- Dealers and Franchisees
- Business Partners
- Temporary employees

Through SAP Companion, eligible external users can access material as part of SAP's supplementary consumption option. But this isn't a stand-alone purchase. It's worthwhile to talk about these license requirements during procurement rather than after deployment if your training strategy heavily involves external audiences.

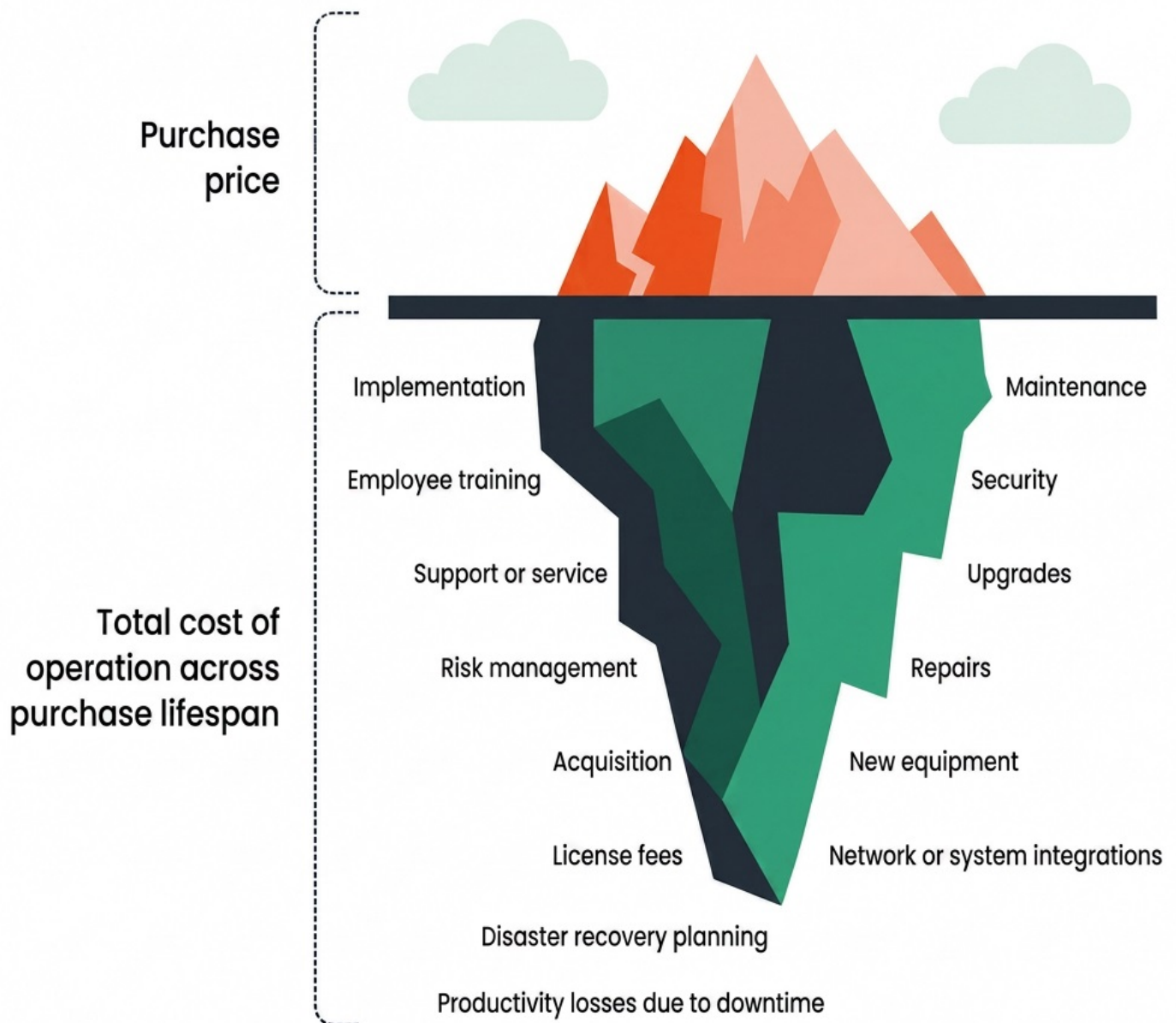
Why Can It Be Challenging to Compare Quotes?
